

Reader A Reading from the book of Genesis.

²²Jacob got up at night and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok.²³He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. ²⁴Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. ²⁵When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. ²⁶Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." ²⁷So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." ²⁶Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." ²⁹Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. ³⁰So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved." ³¹The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

Reader A Reading from Paul's Second letter to Timothy.

¹⁴As for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, ¹⁵and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

⁴⁴In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: ²proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. ³For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, ⁴and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. ⁵As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

SERMON

The Rev. Dr. Barbara Stewart

THE CREED

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully

receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.



Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Today and next Sunday we'll be singing a new hymn, No. 698, at the Offertory, composed by Carl Schalk (1929-2021), a renowned Lutheran composer and teacher. Both tune and text are good examples of the work of contemporary American authors and composers. The text is, like both the 23rd Psalm and today's Psalm 121, written in the first person singular. "Constructed chiefly of verbs and nouns, and with only an occasional adjective, it is unvarnished, simple (mostly monosyllabic) and direct, not to say intimate...It moves - from private need to a vision of cosmic redemption in Christ - and then comes to a conclusion that ties up all the loose ends ["to serve my God, and all humanity," vs. 3]." The author's intentional simplicity, directness and immediate accessibility is mirrored in the music, which moves with grace and elegance - the work of a composer who as a master of his art is not afraid to write simple, and uses the simplest of means to create a work of freshness and interest. Schalk named the tune *Flentge* after his mother's birth name; it was also his own middle name. (Quotes from *The Hymnal 1982 Companion* and Hymn 698). Next Sunday: a bit about this hymn's author and his extensive West Coast connections!

Today's anthem is by an early Baroque composer and priest. Ludovico da Viadana (1560-1627) held several prestigious church positions in Italy, and like many other composers wrote secular as well as sacred music. He is of historical importance because he was one of the first composers to include a printed figured bass in his music (figured bass, analogous to shorthand, was a system in which numbers, called figures, are written below a bass part to indicate the basic harmony, so the exact notes of the right hand part didn't need to be written down). There are many beautiful settings of *Adoramus te*. While this is the only version I've seen with this last Latin line, this familiar and frequently set text, like most others of the time, had many variants.

Finally, we sing the psalm today, a paraphrase of the beautiful Psalm 121. Please sing the melody, as the Choir will be singing two different 18th century harmonizations.


