

Sunday, November 20 – The Rev. Will Crist

The Rev. Will Crist is guest celebrant and homilist at Saint Michael's on Sunday, November 20. Rev. Will has been a priest in Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles since the 1970s. He is a certified implementer of EOS (the Entrepreneurial Operating System®), a toolkit that helps organizations clarify, simplify, and achieve their vision. Will is the author of *Everyone On The Same Page* and hosts the podcasts *Pilgrim On The 405* and *Where There's a Will There's a Way*. He is married to The Rev. Canon Mary Crist and lives in Laguna Beach.

Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Today is the final Sunday of the church year, known as “Christ the King” Sunday. According to An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church, it was first celebrated in the Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches on this last Sunday before Advent, and celebrates Christ’s “messianic kingship and sovereign rule over all creation” - kind of a summing up of the Christian story and its ultimate meaning for us. It’s a Sunday of celebration and praise - even including the Gospel lesson describing the Crucifixion. Just before this reading we’ll sing a Sequence hymn from the Holy Week section of our hymnal, which is sad until the final verse puts it in context: “They did not know, as we do now, though empires rise and fall, your Kingdom shall not cease to grow till love embraces all.” The haunting tune in a seldom used mode (scale) is one of several psalm tunes written by the great Renaissance composer Thomas Tallis (+1585). The tune’s modern revival is thanks to Ralph Vaughan Williams (of “For all the saints” fame), serving as editor of the *English Hymnal* of 1906. He fell in love with the striking tune and went on to use it as the basis for his rich and moving *Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis* for strings, written in 1910 and first performed in Gloucester Cathedral. Written when he was 37, it was radical for its time but was his first big hit, and is still one of his most popular pieces; its evocative and luminous writing, drenched with memories of a golden past, gradually came to define the idea of ‘Englishness’ in music, and there are many recordings and YouTube videos of it. Its premiere was also a significant epiphany for at least two other composers - one of them, Herbert Howells (today’s Communion piece), would become the greatest Anglican composer of the century, thanks to hearing this music that night: “Howells was thunder-struck by what he heard in the Tallis Fantasia. ‘For a music-bewildered youth of 17’, he later wrote, ‘it was an overwhelming evening, so disturbing and moving that I even asked RVW for his autograph – and got it!’ Howells and Gurney walked the streets of Gloucester into the early hours that night, excitedly debating what the *Tallis Fantasia* might mean for the future [of English music].”

It’s also Thanksgiving week, and today’s Hymn of Praise is “We gather together.” It’s firmly associated in our minds with this holiday but originally had little or nothing to do with it, and our hymnal’s editors put it in the General Hymns section to try to encourage more frequent use of this general text and fine tune. Text and tune were first published in 1626 (thus a possible though tenuous connection to the Pilgrims), and the original Dutch text celebrated the end of Spanish domination in the Netherlands, with references of God’s retribution against a repressive enemy (“the wicked oppressing now cease from distressing...so from the beginning the fight we were winning...let thy congregation escape tribulation...”).

Our Rector Search: The Vestry’s Interview Prep

When it comes to the Vestry’s candidate interviews, every effort must be made to provide a consistent experience across all candidates so that we’re able to compare apples to apples. To that end, the Vestry’s candidate interviews will be highly structured. Each Vestry member reviewed interview questions on topics that include Spiritual Gifts, Personal Theology, Building Trust, Managing Stress, Preaching, Setting Expectations, and Leading Through Mission, Vision, and Values.


All of the questions are open-ended and behavior-based, predicated on the understanding that past behavior indicates future performance. They prompt a candidate to provide answers that dig deeper to reveal actions and results. Here are some examples:

1. Tell us about a time when a parishioner’s obvious spiritual giftedness led you to ask them to lead a significant ministry. What did you do to convince the person to take on this role and what ultimately resulted?
2. Tell us about a time when you knew your preaching style needed some improvement. How did you know, what action did you take to improve it and how did you know you were doing a better job of preaching afterwards?
3. In your experience, what is the most effective way to ensure synergy between parish initiatives and what staff invest their time on? What steps do you take as rector to keep the two aligned?
4. Not everyone agrees with decisions made by leaders. Tell us about an unpopular decision you had to make and how you gained acceptance from the vestry or a committee that was responsible for helping you carry the decision out.

Saving Water at St. Mike’s

All followers of Jesus share the privilege of caring for God’s world. Water conservation is one way we do that. A concerted St. Mike’s effort to conserve water is beginning to show results. The focus over 2021 was repair of the fire sprinkler and landscape irrigation systems. The result is a 5-year low in water use on campus. In 2022, we reduced water use by 615 HCF or **460,000 gallons!**






