





# The Great Thanksgiving




Worship and praise belong to you, maker of light and darkness.

Wherever you are on your spiritual journey you are welcome to come forward to receive the consecrated wine and wafers. Wine will be served by our chalice bearers from the common cup. 



# Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Psalm 121 is one of the most beautiful and evocative, whether in the original Hebrew, or English. We'll sing it to plainsong between the lessons, and the choir will sing it at the Offertory to an Anglican chant by contemporary British church musician Barry Rose. Rose (b. 1934) has served as Religious Music Advisor to the BBC and organist at Guildford, St. Alban's and St. Paul's Cathedrals, where he directed the music for Prince Charles and Princess Diana in 1981, and got the choir involved in occasionally singing music for British television, Paul McCartney and other pop singers. He wrote this setting of the psalm for the Silver Jubilee Service for Queen Elizabeth II in 1977.

Today's Communion piece, *Parce Domine*, is a Lenten lament meant to be sung during the imposition of ashes on Ash Wednesday. This setting was written by Jacob Obrecht (d. 1505), one of the earliest choral composers. In his time he was famous and esteemed throughout Europe, and the scholar, philosopher and theologian Erasmus was one of his choirboys

Fugues tend to be strong, loud, academic pieces, and are usually composed in one of the more common and easier keys which use fewer accidentals (sharps and flats, the shorter black keys on a keyboard). In keeping with the more subdued mood of Lent, today's organ pieces by Josef Rheinberger (named "Fughetta" rather then "Fugue" because of their relative brevity), are very unusual, the opposite of the stereotypical fugue: softer, more lilting (almost lullabies), in triple meter, and using keys with many accidentals (five flats in the prelude, five sharps in the postlude). Each of these key signatures use only two white keys; the other six are all black. They are harder to play than they sound!

# **About MOMS Orange County**

MOMS Orange County programs are aimed at disrupting the combined dynamics of poverty, lack of health insurance, and barriers to care. These dynamics often lead to impaired maternal and infant health at birth. Many local women are at higher risk for gestational diabetes, maternal depression and pre-term labor, increasing the likelihood of delivering a sick baby with medical complications and contributing to delayed cognitive development.

During pregnancy, our programs address factors that increase the chances of delivering a healthy baby. After birth, the focus of support is on promoting the infant's healthy development and mother's well-being. Key topics include:

- Infant care
- Breastfeeding and nutrition
- Infant health and development
- Immunizations
- Importance of a medical home
- Ensuring favorable health conditions during pregnancy and the critical first year of an infant's development contributes to preventing long-term consequences for families such as delayed development, high medical costs, poor grades in school, high teen pregnancy rates, high rates of gang affiliation, unemployment, and continued poverty.
