The First Reading

Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

Lector A reading from the book of Nehemiah.

ALL THE PEOPLE gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the LORD had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the LORD with their faces to the ground. So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our LORD; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the LORD is your strength."

The Second Reading

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

Lector A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians.

FOR JUST AS THE BODY is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

The Holy Gospel

Luke 4:14-21

THEN JESUS, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me
 to bring good news to the poor.
 He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives
 and recovery of sight to the blind,
 to let the oppressed go free,
 to proclaim the year of the Lord’s favor.”

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, “Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.”

WE GIVE THANKS TO YOU, O GOD, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."



Music Notes, by Ray Urwin: RIP Francis Jackson, 1917-2022




The church music world was saddened to learn that Francis Jackson, CBE, died January 10th at the grand age of 104. He was assistant organist at York Minster, and upon his teacher's death in 1946 he became Organist and Director of Music at the Minster, where he remained for 36 years, continuing the great work of his predecessor at the largest Medieval cathedral in Northern Europe, and England's largest Gothic cathedral. Jackson left an extensive output of both sacred and secular compositions; he is also supposedly the organist who started the fashion of playing Charles Marie Widor's famous Toccata for weddings, having played the work for the wedding of a cousin of the Queen in 1961. Francis Jackson was a true giant of the Anglican choral realm, and one of the last of a generation of great Anglican musicians. As a teenager I heard him play a recital - though more known as a choral director and composer, he could definitely get around on an organ!

Jackson has one tune in our hymnal, No. 424, *For the fruit of all creation*, today's Hymn of Praise and a great modern hymn for Thanksgiving or general use. He originally wrote it for the evening hymn *God that madest earth and heaven*, but due to the great popularity of those words with the familiar Welsh tune, Jackson's tune never caught on with those words. A British hymnologist knew of Jackson's now unattached tune and suggested to a hymn author, F. Pratt Green (1903-2000) that he try writing words for it on a harvest or thanksgiving theme (new hymns on that subject being in short supply), fitting words to Jackson's music with its unusual 84.84.888.4 metre (these numbers are simply the syllables in each phrase, separated by the periods). Green rose to the challenge: his text is equally as fine as Jackson's tune, and the two, a perfect pairing of words and music, are now found in hymnals of many denominations.

Sidebar: you would be surprised to learn that this is quite often the case - the words and music of many hymns were often not originally written to go together, including *Hark the herald angels sing*, *When I survey the wondrous cross*, and *O sacred head sore wounded*. The English words of *Hark, the herald* were sung with several tunes, including *Jesus Christ is risen today!* And the original words were not always sacred or even religious: Mendelssohn's tune was written for a celebration of the anniversary of Gutenberg's invention of printing, and he wrote that his tune "would *never* do with sacred words [emphasis his]!" And the original German words of *O sacred head* were a torch song!

We'll sing Jackson's hymn, named *East Acklam* for the Yorkshire village they lived in, today as our Hymn of Praise, and as the Offertory music I'll be playing a short piece of his written for the enthronement of the Archbishop of York (who later became the Archbishop of Canterbury). A few years ago I played for a local choir's residency at York Minster; my current profile picture on Facebook is of me at the console of the Minster.
