Put your trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and feed on its riches. Take delight in the Lord, and he shall give you your heart's desire. **Refrain.**

Commit your way to the Lord and put your trust in him, and he will bring it to pass. He will make your righteousness as clear as the light and your just dealing as the noonday. **Refrain.**

⁴²So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. ⁵⁰What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

Music Notes from Ray Urwin

Vocally, most Episcopal music programs are choral, but today our male section leaders sing a duet for the Epiphany season by a German composer rarely heard today, Johann Philipp Krieger (1649-1725). A contemporary of Bach, Krieger was a renowned keyboard player, composer and court music director, performing all over Europe. He remained with a royal patron in what would be his last position, for 45 years; during that time the court's musical establishment became one of Germany's greatest. Krieger was also a prolific composer and supplied the court with countless sacred and secular works, including some 2,000 cantatas, at least 18 operas, and much other music. He also had numerous works by other composers performed at the court, kept a catalogue of every piece he performed, and actively published his own music, all unusual for that time. Unfortunately, much of his music is lost: for instance, of those 2,000 cantatas only 76 survive today.

The duet is from a cantata composed for the second Sunday of Easter in 1698; we'll be singing it again with the original German words during the Easter season this spring.

Today's organ music is by Louis Vierne, the renowned blind organist of Notre Dame in the first third of the last century. The dreamy *Arabesque* (prelude) uses the unusual and exotic wholetone scale (which uses whole steps between each note instead of the usual combinations of whole and half steps), introduced to Western music by Claude Debussy; *Communion* is from a group of three pieces and was written for a new Notre Dame priest's first Mass in 1930. Vierne died, as he had wished, at the console of the Notre Dame organ, during a recital in 1937.


