



¹¹But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; ¹²and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. ¹³They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." ¹⁴When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). ¹⁷Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." ¹⁸Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Music Notes by Ray Urwin

On tour in the U.S. during the Christmas season of 1921, Marcel Dupré, the renowned organist at St. Sulpice in Paris, took four melodies to improvise upon suggested by audience members, at the famous organ inside the Wanamaker Department Store in Philadelphia. Two were Christmas melodies, and two were from Holy Week and Easter chants. Three years later he wrote out and published these improvisations as his Symphonie-Passion, Op. 23. The four movements musically narrate the life of Christ. The final movement, today's main Prelude, ends in crashing chords, a joyfully cacophonous and inspiring sonic depiction of the resurrection. *Notes by Gregg Wager / LA Phil, adapted by Ray Urwin.*


