

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *AMEN*.

Music Notes by Ray Urwin

Today our male section leaders sing another duet from the great German composer Heinrich Schütz's *Kleines Geistliches Konzerte*. In the introduction to the collection written for modest resources as the Thirty Years War raged around him, he wrote, "As with the other liberal arts, music has not only been crippled by the continued warfare, but has even ceased entirely in many places. This is evident to everyone, no less than the widespread destruction and disorder which unholy war brings with it." Jakob Handl (Communion) had a wide-ranging style, blending the old with the new. He could be quite sophisticated, or write simple and direct pieces such as this, using common chords and rhythms, sung together, known as homophony. Illustrating the virtue of simplicity and direct expression, it is one of his best-known and most profound works. It was later used by Handel in his funeral anthem *The Ways of Zion Do Mourn* (1737).
