





Music Notes by Ray Urwin

The words of today's Offertory hymn (581) complement today's Good Samaritan gospel, but both words and music may be less familiar or new to us. The tune first appeared in 1592 in the Whole Book of Psalms, compiled by Thomas Easte, an important publisher of both sacred and secular music. It was the first psalter to include tune names (by which all hymn music is now catalogued) and voice parts rather than part-books (each book containing only a single voice part). As was the custom at the time, the melody (today's soprano part) was in the tenor part. This format was their normal, and dates back to the earliest choral music, arising in monasteries and abbeys during the Middle Ages and continuing into the 19th century; in fact, the tenor part is so named because it came from the Latin teneo, to hold, meaning they were the "holders" (tenors) of the melodies. This hymn, which may or may not have been composed by him, is one of the few tunes named by Easte himself. He liked to name tunes after English counties; thus this tune name is Cheshire.

Our Rector Search: Phase 4 Update

The Rector Search Committee met on Tuesday, June 21, with the Rev. Cn. Thomas Quijada-Discavage of the Diocese, who provided us with the files for our candidates. He asks that the committee not divulge the number of candidates.

Committee members will be reading these files and will meet July 19 to reflect together and move forward with the assessments and interviews.

Canon Tom noted two recent trends in rector searches. One is a trend, probably caused by COVID, for rectors to be less likely to put their names out as interested in particular parishes. This trend means that rectors who do express interest are serious candidates and bodes well for our search. The other trend is towards a historically huge number of openings: Our diocese now has 46. The reasons for all these openings are demographic and social. Many Baby Boom rectors are reaching the mandatory retirement age of 72. Others with 30 years in ministry are retiring early because of pandemic exhaustion.

The Rector Search Committee is eager to begin exploring the candidates' materials: a letter of introduction, a CV or resume, and responses to the questions in the parish profile.




